Dear Parents and Carers,



Our Book Fair is an annual event. It gives everyone in the school community a chance to buy the latest publications and engage in reading for pleasure. It will be open Tuesday 11th March - Thursday 13th March, 3.20 pm to 4.30 pm each day in the Key Stage 2 Hall.

- Wish List . If you can't attend, your child can visit the Fair and write down what they would like. You pay online and they can collect the books in school when notified.
- Your child will be able to use their World Book Day token to get £1 off any book at the Fair.
- Cash is also accepted

As an added bonus, a percentage of the money made will go towards the school being able to buy more books for the children to read. The more money we make the bigger the percentage given. Please take time to visit the Book Fair and encourage your child to read for pleasure. At the same time, you would be helping to school to raise funds to purchase more books.

Our World Our Future: Key Stage 1






Our World Our Future: Key Stage 2

Year 6 Trip to The Natural History Museum

Our Year 6 pupils had an exciting and enriching visit to the Natural History Museum, where they explored the wonders of the past and deepened their understanding of the natural world.

One of the highlights was the dinosaur section, where pupils were amazed by the towering skeletons and fascinating fossils. They were also captivated by the stunning crystals and gemstones, learning about how these spectacular formations are mined from the earth.

Linking in with our science lessons on classification, the children took part in a biodiversity workshop, where they had the opportunity to classify real mini-beasts. Seeing these creatures up close through a microscope was not for the faint-hearted! This hands-on experience brought learning to life, helping pupils to apply their knowledge in an exciting and interactive way.

The trip not only enriched their understanding of classification but also sparked their curiosity about the many wonders of natural history. We hope it has inspired them to keep exploring and asking big scientific questions!

















Year 6 Trip to Bruce Castle

Building on our fascinating visit to the **Natural History Museum** last week, our **Year 6** pupils had another exciting opportunity to extend their learning with a **workshop on fossils** at **Bruce Castle Museum**.

During the session, pupils got hands-on with **real fossils**, some of which were **hundreds of millions of years old!** One of the highlights was handling a **woolly mammoth's tooth**, which was astonishingly **the size of a child's head**. The workshop explored how fossils are formed and the vital role of **palaeontologists and archaeologists** in uncovering Earth's ancient past.

It was an unforgettable experience that deepened our pupils' curiosity and understanding of the natural world—who knows, we may even have some future fossil hunters in our midst!

Parents, you can help at home too! Try testing your child on their times tables at dinner, on the way to school, or during a spare moment in the day. Every bit of practice builds their confidence, and together, we can ensure that times tables remain a real strength at Lordship Lane!


Young Academies Entrepreneurs

Attendance Matters – Let's Aim for 95% and Beyond!

While we're celebrating these fantastic achievements, it's important to recognise that **our overall school attendance needs to improve quickly.** Attendance is a vital part of your child's education, and every day in school matters. Let's see if we can all work together to get above **95% attendance** as a school community.

Why Does Attendance Matter?

To help illustrate the impact of missed school days, here's a quick guide showing how days missed convert into attendance percentages:

Percentage AttendanceDays Missed Per Year

100% = 0 days missed

95% = 9.5 days missed

90% = 19 days missed

85% = 28.5 days missed

80% = 38 days missed

As you can see, even a small drop in attendance can quickly add up to significant missed learning time.

How You Can Help

- Ensure your child attends school every day unless they're genuinely unwell.
- Schedule appointments outside of school hours whenever possible.

• Support your child with a consistent morning routine to help them arrive on time and ready to learn.

Attendance will continue to be reported in our fortnightly newsletter, so let's see which classes can take the top spots next time! Together, we can make a real difference and ensure our children get the best possible education.
